Welcome to the 27th edition of isoLACE, the ALG NSW Branch's coronavirus update.

We look forward to meeting in person again very soon for April Lace Day. We're also looking forward to the tatting display by Stephanie.

Lacemaking at the Powerhouse Museum will start again in 2022. The Powerhouse Museum is offering free entry to the museum; proof of vaccination required and wearing a mask is compulsory. Lacemaking is demonstrated daily 10am to 1pm, resuming in 2022 from Saturday 8th January, on Level 4 in the Textiles Centre. Social lace days and lace workshops will resume when a venue becomes available.

Lace Workshop with Lindy de Wijn | 1pm to 4pm | 28 May

In this workshop, artist Lindy de Wijn, with the support of the NSW lacer community, will use the Powerhouse Textile Centre as a backdrop to highlight the rhythm and beauty of bobbin lace. Inspired by current Powerhouse exhibition Eucalyptusdom, each participant will create their own bobbin lace eucalypt leaf, while learning movements in lace as well as simple lace techniques to form unique leaf designs.

Lindy de Wijn is a contemporary lace maker with a Masters in Public Art, who is drawn to the Australian landscape and eucalypts in her designs. Lindy has used these forms to connect community, space, and lace, and create a dialogue about lace as a living textile.

Lace Guild | New South Wales Branch Commemorative Award

The Commemorative Award is a Biennial Award created in 2000 in memory of members who have made a significant contribution to the Guild and who are no longer with us.

Initially, on alternate occasions new and experienced lace makers were invited to submit lace of any type and in any form, from a bookmark to a bedspread for competition.

The winner will be decided by popular vote at the Annual General Meeting. This year, due to circumstances, all lace makers will be eligible to enter. You may enter any type of lace (not necessarily recently made) and any article of any size.

The Award was usually held in even years, but, due to matters mostly beyond our control, there has been a lapse over recent years. This is an opportunity to showcase the work being done by members and for entrants to have the chance to win a worthwhile prize if successful.

This competition is to be held at the August A.G.M and the winner will be decided by popular vote. Entries need to be brought along to the A.G.M. in August (no entry form, no entry fee).

Don't think you are not good enough! It is not necessarily the best made piece of lace which wins this award but the piece which has the most popular appeal!!

Traditional Czech Tulle Lace

Self-help Group, Lace Day Afternoons, June & August 2022



An untutored, self-help group will look at traditional Czech tulle lace on the afternoons of Lace Days in June and August. The group will run in the Main Dining Room, 1-2pm. June Lace Day will be getting started; while August Lace Day will be a show-and-tell discussion about personal progress.

Lacemakers will work at their own pace on one of two small projects (or both), helping each other get to the finish line. A coloured lace is suitable for anyone with some Torchon experience. A more advanced white lace pattern is suitable for those with some Bucks Point experience, or for anyone with Torchon experience wanting to try something different.

Photos, prickings, working diagrams are available on the internet. Search for the website is <https://bobbinlacee.eu>. Go to the 'Learning Materials' webpage and search the nation handbooks: 'Czech Republic'.

Photocopies will be available on the day, but you will provide your own pillow, thread, and bobbins.

If there is sufficient interest, future self-help groups will look at Spanish Hinojosa and French coloured leaves, which are part of the OI DFA project.

My preparation for the self-help group sessions on Czech tulle lace at June and August Lace Days is going well. Working very large has felt like throwing rope around horses!



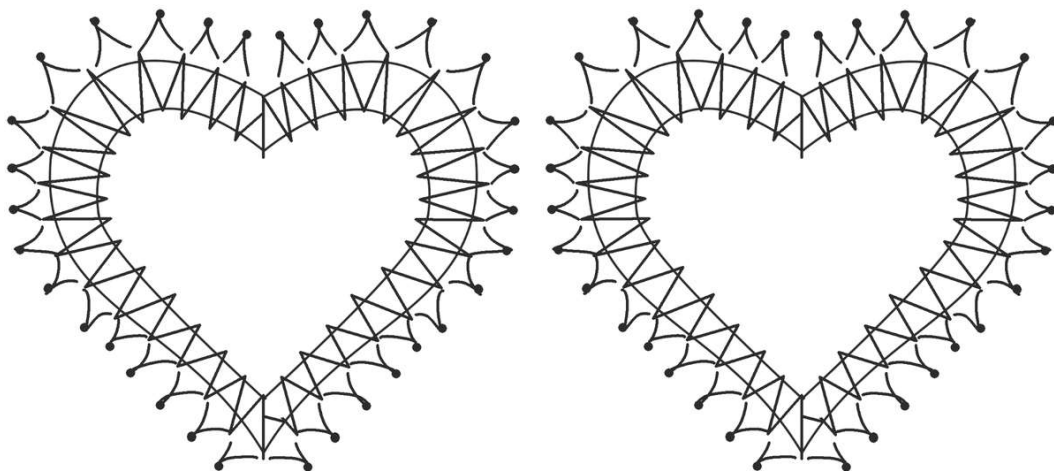
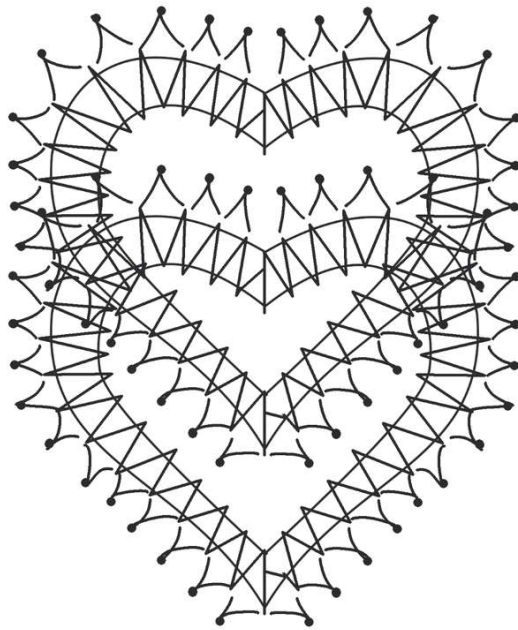
